

Pupil Premium Statement 2012-13

In April 2011 the Government introduced the Pupil Premium; funding for children from low-income families who are eligible for free school meals. The Government believes that the Pupil Premium, which is additional to main school funding, is the best way to address the current underlying inequalities between children eligible for free school meals and their wealthier peers by ensuring that funding to tackle disadvantage reaches the pupils who need it most.

Torriano Junior School Pupil received **£95316** for the Pupil Premium.

The school prioritised the funding to support all **FSM pupils** who are either under-achieving or in danger of under-achieving. The Pupil Premium was used to fund the following strategies:

- **Interventions** that support individual children or small groups with specific specialised teaching, particularly in maths and English.
- **One to one tuition** is where pupils were given intensive tuition, during and after school.
- **School Home Support** provides the school with a dedicated member of staff (SHS worker) to provide advice and support for parents with particular focus on academic achievement.
- **Social and emotional support** through the work of the Pastoral care Leader.
- **Curriculum enrichment** through the arts and sport giving pupils an opportunity to develop confidence and skills through learning to play instruments or enjoy sporting skills.
- **Self and peer assessment** by teaching pupils specific strategies to set goals, monitor and evaluate their own learning.
- **An extended school programme** offering a wide range of extracurricular clubs both before and after school.

End of KS2 FSM Analysis

Due to our interventions the percentage of FSM pupils achieving level 4 combined exceeded the percentage of Non FSM by **1%**.

94% (FSM) pupils achieved level 4 in Reading, Writing and Maths KS2 SATs;

23% (FSM) pupils achieved level 5 in Reading, Writing and Maths KS2 SATs.

93.5% of FSM pupils achieved 2 levels of progress in Reading and Writing from KS1 to KS2;

100% of FSM pupils achieved 2 levels of progress in Maths from KS1 to KS2.

19% of (FSM) pupils made better than expected progress in Reading.

45% of (FSM) pupils made better than expected progress in Writing.

48% of (FSM) pupils made better than expected progress in Maths.
